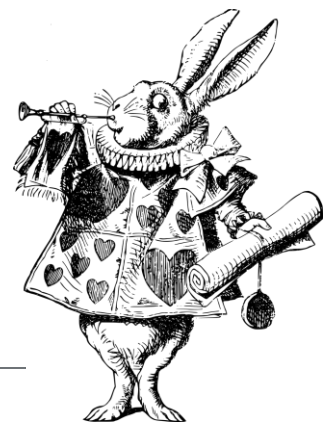

Ollie's request..

Hi, I'm Ollie and I am a J.R.S.O, which stands for Junior Road Safety Officer and it is my duty to make sure children at Bramfield Primary School and children living in Huntingfield travel safely to and from school. In our village the Hub is used as a bus stop for children travelling to the school.

I am concerned about people driving too quickly through Huntingfield, especially past the Hub. It is now getting dark earlier and our roads have no pavements and not much lighting. This makes it unsafe for children and their parents travelling to and from the bus stop. There are a few things that we can do to help people to be safer travelling to and from the bus stop:

- If you are walking it's a good idea to bring a light source like a torch or wear reflective clothing. Watch closely for cars and traffic and try to travel in groups.
- If you are driving through the village please slow down and drive carefully. Look out for children and adults walking in the road. Make sure you put your headlights on earlier now that it gets dark early.

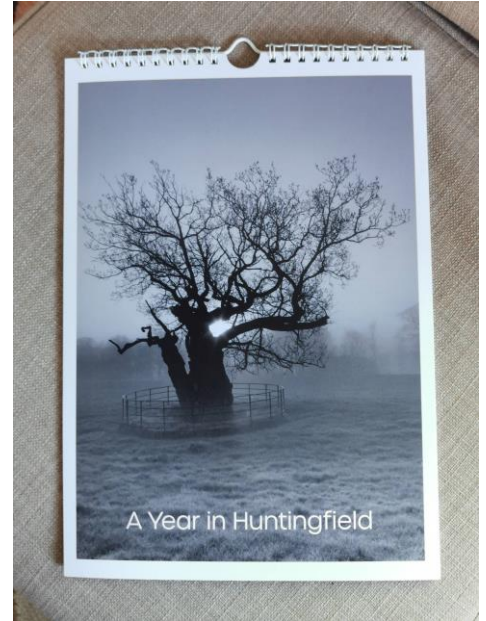

We do have some limited spaces remaining for New Year's Eve dining so give us a call if you haven't yet made any arrangements.

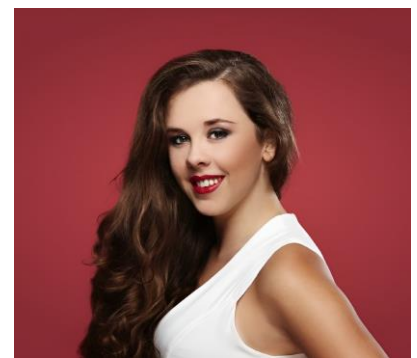

Thank you to all who attended Race Night on 16th November in the Hub. It was a great night, enjoyed by all. Thanks to everyone who donated prizes and all those that helped on the evening. The grand sum of £332.50 was raised to help with the general upkeep of the Hub.

David's Column



First of all, a big thank you to everyone who turned out to help with the village tidy up. I believe that at least 16 people were there on the Saturday and several others turned out during the week to complete various tasks.

A big discussion point at the recent Parish Council meeting was the continued development of Valley Farm and the holiday lodges on the adjacent land. A major frustration was the retrospective applications for the lodges which added 50% more beds to the development.

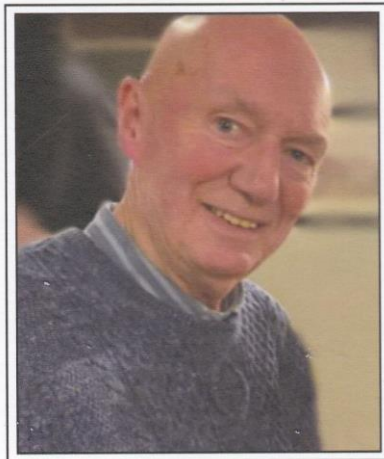
Also, a serious concern raised was the short-term use of Laundry Lane as an entrance for two of the properties and the long-term use of the Brick Kiln Lane entrance as an access point for the lodges and for Blyth Barn, which is currently being advertised as capable of hosting events for up to 200 people. There were no planning reasons for objecting to the retrospective application.

Another further concern raised was the state of the road and verge outside Malt Cottages. The verge has been pushed back from the edge of the road surface by about three feet. Which has led to large potholes, mud and debris on the road. There is now a risk that the verge can easily be pushed into the ditch, thereby blocking it and causing further flooding issues. The damage has been done by a combination of ever widening agricultural vehicles, HGVs and vans passing the cars parked outside the cottages. The road damage/potholes have been posted on the Suffolk Highways solution to the flood risk.

Since our last meeting there has been a new Premises Licence application for Blyth Barn (Valley Farm). It is for alcohol (on and off sales) 24 hours/day, live and recorded music (indoors) everyday 08.00 to 01.00 and late-night refreshment (indoors) everyday 23.00 to 05.00. There will be a Parish Council meeting to discuss our response to this application on Wednesday 4th December at 19.00 in The Hub. All welcome.

Sheep Talk...



All the ladies have had the rams running with them for almost three weeks now. It will soon be time for the boys to have a thick, coloured raddle paste applied to their chest and front legs. In this way we can tell from a quick glance whether they ewes are going to lamb early or later during the lambing cycle. With a bit of luck, there shouldn't be too many bright blue bottoms!



This year the Mule ewes (a crossbreed good for vigor and hardiness) have some very attractive new Suffolk rams running with them. Their progeny should make extremely nice lambs, and eventually, some very good mothers themselves. I did notice today that there is a naughty ram who has escaped from

the Romney ladies and joined the Mules. As they say, the grass is always greener on the other side... I suppose in April we will find out whether his escape was worth his time and effort!

The grass is now growing more slowly and the sheep are starting to graze it off faster than it can recover. In a couple of weeks some of the store lambs we have at Heveningham will go away for their winter holidays, leaving more grazing for the ewes. Fingers crossed that the winter will be kind to us once again.

Unfortunately, due to the lush grass throughout the year, lameness continues to be a major issue with the flocks. This year has been the worst in all the time I've

worked here at Heveningham. With a bit of luck, the colder weather will put paid to a lot of the issues that are causing the problems.

We held our Macmillan charity sheepdog trial here at Heveningham on the 5th October. We had a lovely show of dogs and handlers over the day and several locals turned out to come and watch the action. The total amount raised on the day came to £946.43 (with the inclusion of Gift Aid). We also had lots of very generous donations of cakes, homemade jams etc. that were sold on the day. I'm already looking forward to the next season.



Our first Heveningham trial will be on the August Bank Holiday weekend. I always choose this date as it is close to what would have been David Hull's birthday. The highest pointed working

shepherd is presented the David Hull Memorial Crook. David was always a supporter of 'proper dogs' as he liked to call them.

Nature Notes



We have recently moved a short distance to a thatched cottage close to Huntingfield Church. It's in a lovely setting, overlooked by a very tall Giant Redwood. This magnificent tree was planted around two hundred years

ago, probably by the vicar who then lived in the vicarage (Holland House). It's very likely that he also planted the huge Copper Beech that stands in our garden.

The Giant Redwood (*Sequoiadendrin giganteum*) is the largest species of tree on Earth. In its native California it can grow up to 90 metres. The sheer size means they can hold a lot of carbon, thus making them very environmentally beneficial. They have been imported to Britain since the early 19th century and now thrive here, with the tallest being around 50 metres. The UK trees are classed as young, as they can live for up to 2000 years in the Sierra Nevada region of California. The bark is very soft and rather like polystyrene to touch and the Treecreeper, a small British native bird, has been known to roost in small crevices in its insulating bark.



So, next time you walk past do have a look at the tallest tree in our parish. We also have a young version of this tree on the Millennium Green, planted in memory of Esther Munns who was a founder and long-standing

member of the Millennium Green Trustees.


From an incredibly large living organism to a very small one. David Blackmore recently told me that he found a tiny bird trapped in his garden shed. Before successfully releasing his diminutive visitor, he took a picture to confirm its identity. It was, as he suspected, a female Goldcrest.



Along with the Firecrest it is our smallest breeding British bird, weighing around 5 grams: a Wren weighs almost twice as much! They breed in local gardens, favouring

evergreens such as Yew. Their dome-shaped nests of moss and lichen can house up to 11 young in a single brood. The male has a surprisingly loud, very high-pitched song which can be heard from early spring. At this time of year our local non-migrant breeding birds are joined by thousands of migrating Goldcrests from Scandinavian countries who fly across the North Sea.

Shortly after moving into our cottage, we noticed a constant sound of bees coming from the fireplace in one of the bedrooms. Looking up at the chimney on the next warm day we could see hundreds of bees going in and out of an air brick on the chimney's side. We initially thought that this was a swarm which, hopefully, would soon depart. But, after asking previous residents of the house, we discovered that the bees had been there for quite a few years!

Thankfully we found a fantastically helpful local beekeeper, Sam, from Kessingland who runs a business specialising in the safe and live removal of bee nests.



He arranged for scaffolding to be erected and, dressed in his bee suit, he removed quite a lot of bricks and then tackled the nest. Sam estimated that there were still around 50,000 bees in the nest.

The queen was carefully transferred to a travelling hive and then left near the chimney while Sam came down to catch his breath. He had been stung on both wrists and was absolutely covered in bees - many of them had flown off by the time I took the photo.

Within a few hours the majority of the workers had entered this special hive, searching out their missing queen. The bees were taken to where he has many other hives stationed (around 200!), all coming from removals.



Sam then set about removing the wax comb from our chimney, which still held a lot of honey. He thought there was a combined weight of around 100kg of wax and honey! A builder came a few days later to repair the

brickwork and seal the air brick with a special gauze. So, the bees will not return next summer although we still have residual honey running down the wall of the fireplace.

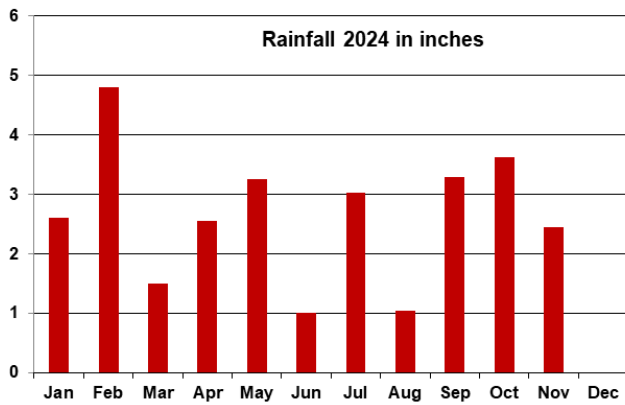

Weather report: Oct-Nov 2024

Compared with October/November 2023, rainfall totals this year have been unspectacular for the corresponding two months. Last year saw 11.56" (294mm) but there was only 6.07" (154mm) this year – which equates to 5.48" (139mm) less. Despite this, we are above the average annual rainfall already. This year, in Huntingfield we have had 29.12" (740mm) already so 2024 is by no means a dry year, although, compared with the areas battered by storms Bert & Conall we are dry!

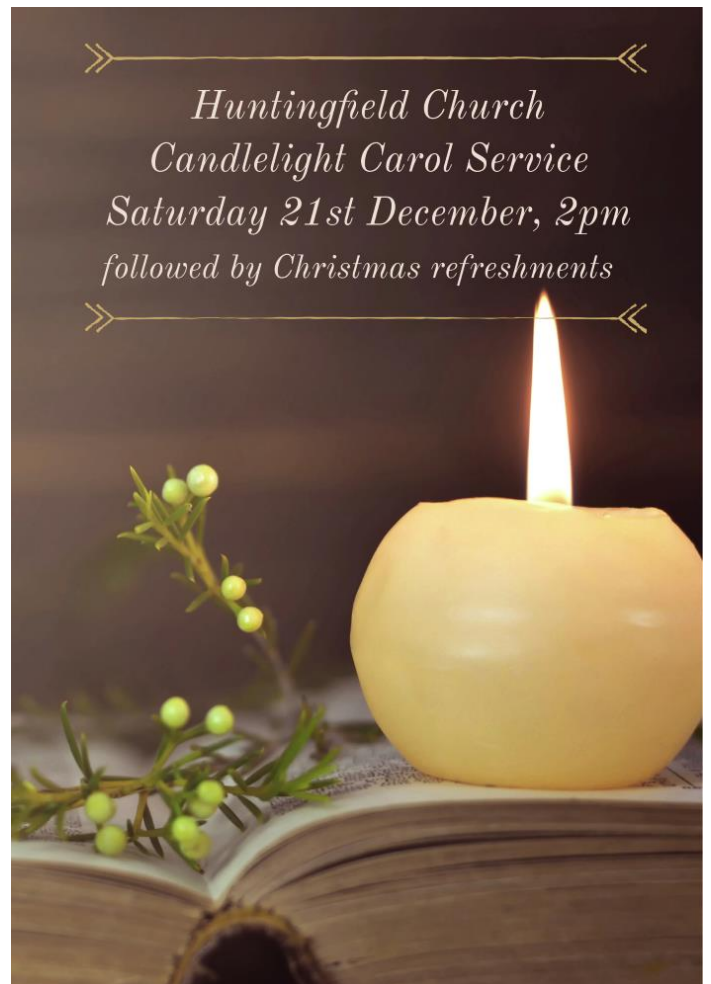
Disappointingly, the amount of cloud cover during the last two months is following the trend of less sunshine. My reasoning as to why I have said previously. I don't see this changing markedly for a while. The weather this November has been more typical, with wind, frosts and sometimes remarkably mild and wet.



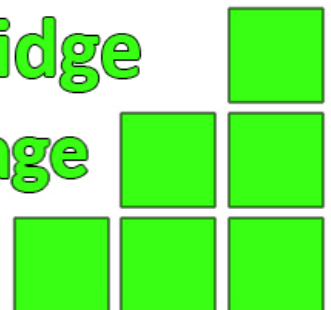
I hope you enjoyed seeing the Aurora Borealis given that we were blessed with a few cloud-free evenings. It was a first for me and for many others.
